From our Minister:

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place... All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." – Acts 2:1,4

Dear All,

I was never very good at learning other languages at school and quickly dropped those subjects in favour of the Sciences. I subsequently tried to learn some German and some Spanish during my adult life, but struggled to get beyond the basics to a point where I would be able to converse with other people.

In the book of Acts, Luke describes the moment when Jesus' disciples suddenly received the ability to speak in numerous different languages. The disciples were in the middle of an international crowd, with many different languages, when the Holy Spirit enabled them to communicate with everyone.

I wish it could be that easy! I'm all for learning other languages, but this story isn't about us taking lessons in Finnish or immersing ourselves in Gaelic. Instead, I believe this passage is about learning to speak in ways that are relevant to the people around us.

Our ways of communicating with others are changing every day – and yet as a Church we still tend to think that the Sunday morning service is the only way that we can communicate our faith to others. There's a whole generation who use social media platforms to communicate with their families and friends. Tweets, TikToks, and texts have become the language of most people under the age of 40. Many companies and organisations have realised this and are using social media platforms to advertise their products and promote their views.

As a Church we have a strong message to proclaim. One of the ways we do so is by providing a wide range of support services for the people of Scotland and beyond. But we are not good at telling people what we do and why we do it. Are we going to wait for the people around us to walk through our doors to learn the language of church? Or are we going to learn to speak a new language and share our story with others? Perhaps this could be our Pentecost moment?

Minutes of the Stated Annual Meeting of Pilrig St. Paul's Church of Scotland.

The Stated Annual Meeting of the congregation took place within worship at Pilrig St. Paul's Church at 11 am on Sunday 19th May 2024.

The Minutes of the previous Stated Annual Meeting of the Congregation were printed in the church magazine and taken as read.

The Congregational Treasurer presented the 2023 financial accounts of the congregation and raised the following points.

The total income for 2023 was £102,854. This is an increase of £25,100. The majority of the increase, £22,391 came from an unexpected legacy. We received a legacy several years ago and a policy had been missed from the estate so we got our share of this.

Total Expenditure for 2022 was £92,611 an increase of £16,953.

We had a surplus of £10,243 last year. This is good but we have to remember without the legacy of £22,391 we would have had a deficit of £12,148.

The largest amount of income came from hall lets (38%). This does include the payment we get from Vodafone for the rental of the room they have their equipment in. Offerings (29%) were the second largest income source for 2023. Almost a third of the offerings received came from one member and I want to thank them for their continued support. The tax recovered makes up 6% of the income so if anyone does pay tax and isn't signed up for gift aid please speak to me as it makes a big difference to the income we get.

Weddings and funerals provided 1% of our income but unfortunately it all came from funerals. The remaining 26% is in Others. This is higher than normal as it includes the legacy.

The largest expense (31%) was our Giving to Grow contribution. (This replaced Ministry & Mission). The second largest was fabric at 22%. Last year we needed to carry out large repairs to the church roof and also had to have work completed on the manse roof. Salaries account for 14% of the expenditure, this includes the cost of the cleaning company we are using. 9% goes to Insurance and 8% to heating and lighting. The remaining 16% is Other running expenses we have including Presbytery Assessment, maintenance of the organ and telephone / broadband.

Rev Mark Foster thanked Mark Wexelstein for the financial record keeping of the congregation. He also advised to congregation this would be the last time the information would be presented to the congregation as when the Union takes place the accounts will be amalgamated. He commented that it was good to see we had managed to have a surplus over the last three years as he remembered when he became minister we had been in deficit for 18 years.

The following members were re-elected to serve for a further period of office on the Congregational Board.

Evelyn Torrance and Nancy Fleming, proposed by Mark Wexelstein and seconded by John Innes

Rev Mark Foster thanked everyone who had helped and served the congregation in 2023 but there were too many to name them individually.
